The Problem

With 84% of people globally identifying with a religion, there is significant religious diversity in America and abroad. Yet Americans know little about global religions.[1] Growing numbers stereotype, discriminate against, or commit violence against others different from them.[2] As of 2018, over 80% of hate crimes worldwide are committed against religious and racial minorities.[3] Schools, houses of worship, and people have been attacked, with hateful ideas and acts spreading in schools, media, and public fora in many countries.[4] Global citizens must be educated about world religions to foster sustainable and just civil societies.

Our Mission

To counter these insidious, violent trends and to foster understanding and respect, Rice University's Boniuk Institute researches forces driving hate and bias, and promotes religious literacy and tolerance among people of all worldviews through education, leadership training, and the arts. Our engagement in government, business, nonprofits, and the arts differentiates us from similar entities at other universities.


Our Research Impact

Through conferences, publications, and research grants, we support cuttingedge studies on the conditions under which religious tolerance flourishes or fails, and how different peoples understand, practice, or challenge interfaith cooperation across time and space.[5] Locally, we oversee research on hate incidents and crimes in greater Houston, including religious bias, via the Houston Coalition Against Hate.[6]

To understand and respond to youth experiences with religious tolerance, the Institute administered Rice University's participation in Interfaith Diversity Experiences and Attitudes Longitudinal Survey (IDEALS), a national, four-year longitudinal study examining Gen Z encounters with religious and worldview diversity in undergraduate life.[7]

Our staff have been featured [8] in three documentary films produced by UNESCO Global Peace, International Religious Freedom Peace Activist, and the Middle East Leadership Network. They have published with Oneworld Publications, Wipf and Stock, Duke University Press, Fortress Press, The New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Foreign Policy, and The Hill. Institute staff have served as a reviewer for the National Endowment for the Humanities, Religious Freedom Center, and The Social Studies Texan, and as an Education Consultant for the Eternal Gandhi Museum Houston.

The demand for religious literacy education is urgent given the alarming consequences of widespread religious illiteracy.[9] Research shows that just one semester of required religious literacy education in high school by teachers trained in world religions showed increased passive and active tolerance toward minority "others" among students.[10] In the absence of a required course, religious literacy education in social studies must begin with training teachers who can promote student learning outcomes that create a more just, tolerant, and equitable civil society.[11]

Every semester and most summers, we offer professional development (PD) trainings for secondary social studies teachers nationally, based on teaching practices grounded in First Amendment principles.[12] We partner with Houston Independent School District, the largest district in Texas and seventh largest district in the nation. Our summer PDs have engaged teachers from 31 Texas Independent Districts, 1 TEA Region, Virginia's Henrico County Public Schools, the Maine Department of Education Conferences, and the National Council for Social Studies. Due to COVID-19, our 2020 summer PD has moved online enabling 80 secondary educators from 8 states (TX, CA, IL, GA, FL, MI, NJ, TN) and 7 countries (Afghanistan, Canada, India, Pakistan, Tanzania, UK, USA) to learn together and from experts about diverse world religions.




RESOURCES FOR K-12 YOUTH

Since the 2016 election, bullying, intolerance, and violence have increased on American college campuses, especially toward Muslim students[13], and toward racial, religious, and sexual minorities in middle and high schools.[14] In America, faith diversity in social studies curricula are not always comprehensive or academically robust. 

Enhancing Religious Literacy at Rice University







Intolerance knows no boundaries. It is a centuries-old problem that has grown exponentially in recent decades.[18] Studies show that social media amplifies bigotry[19] as evidenced following attacks on religious and racial minorities and their houses of worship in Charleston 2015, Charlottesville 2017, Pittsburgh 2018, and Christchurch 2019. As of 2000, only 5% of American undergraduates took courses in religion.[20] To respond to current trends and fill the education gap, Boniuk Institute has:

Educated on Religious & Racial Bigotry

- Hosted Morehouse College's Dean Lawrence Carter Sr. to discuss the legacy of King & Gandhi and its impact on his work[21]
- Co-sponsored Rice's Black Male Leadership Initiative efforts bridging race, religion, and justice[22]
- Held teach-ins on anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, and religion & politics

Expanded Interfaith Leadership Development

- Sent 12 Rice students to Interfaith Leadership Institutes, and added campus-wide interfaith service opportunities at Rice
- Trained 250+ undergraduates nationally in interfaith leadership

Enhanced Religious Life & Accommodations

- Supported designation of the first interfaith prayer space at Rice[23]
- Advised administration on relevant policies, trainings, and building projects

COUNTERING ANTI-SEMITISM WITH OUR PARTNERS

Anti-Semitism—or hostility to, prejudice or discrimination against Jews—is the oldest form of structural hatred known. Attacks on Jewish institutions and communities in the U.S. reached a forty-year high in 2019. [25]

Boniuk Institute partners with local and national organizations to help the public understand and respond to anti-Semitism constructively. Examples include:

- * Working with Rice affiliates to deliver a teach-in & vigil after the Pittsburgh Tree of Life synagogue shootings
- * Partnering with Holocaust Museum Houston (HMH) and DaCamera to host concerts & talks on the Music of Miecyslaw Weinberg at HMH, Kinder High School for the Performing and Visual Arts, and the Galveston Residency
- * Collaborating with the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) to train university faculty & staff how to combat white supremacist propaganda on college campuses, which is at an all-time high, and with ADL and Tanenbaum Center to train corporate leaders on bias and discrimination against religious minorities in the workplace
- * Co-sponsoring HMH's exhibition of "Coexistence", an installation of 45 vinyl panels—created by the Museum on the Seam, Jerusalem—in Houston's Hermann Park





Training Civic & Corporate Leaders

The religious and racial diversity of the global and American workforces continues to grow[26], including among Gen Z.[27] Yet, diverse workplaces without religious diversity-related training, policies, and metrics[28] are correlated with increased discrimination and decreased revenues, retention, and performance. Studies show that engaging stakeholders' religious identities at work increases revenues, workplace satisfaction, and inclusion.[29]

Boniuk Institute and its partners—including Tanenbaum Center, Religious Freedom and Business Foundation, and National Diversity Council—train and guide C-suite leaders, managers, and HR to engage religious diversity at work.



FURNISHING EXPERTISE TO THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

The U.S. Department of Justice Community Relations Service (CRS) prevents and resolves community conflicts motivated by bias and hate against protected classes, like religion, race, gender, and national origin.[30]

In response to rising hate crimes against religious and racial minorities and attacks on places of prayer in the U.S., and to complement training on anti-Semitism provided by the Anti-Defamation League, Boniuk Institute works with CRS to train law enforcement, government officials, and community leaders on engaging and building partnerships with American Muslims.[31] Institute staff serves the CRS as a Subject Matter Expert, Trainer, and the sole National Trainer of Trainers on the customs and civil rights issues impacting the diverse American Muslim community.

At the invitation of CRS, our staff have participated in Bias Incidents & Hate Crimes Fora and Protecting Places of Worship Fora. We have also trained law enforcement at the behest of local police departments. [32]







Providing Thought Leadership

Boniuk Institute has advised the G-20 Interfaith Form[33], United Nations Alliance-USA[34], the Asian University for Women[35], U.S. State Department's Office of Religion and Global Affairs[36] and Office of International Religious Freedom[37], and several task forces under Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner[38].

Each opportunity integrates religious freedom and literacy in the US and abroad to enhance understanding, respect and engagement among diverse peoples, and to reduce intolerance, bias, and violence.

ARTS OF TOLERANCE

Under the umbrella of the Boniuk Institute, Arts of Tolerance [39] was launched in 2018 to promote tolerance, our shared humanity, and understanding through the arts. Over two years, we hosted 34 programs and reached an audience of 17,000.


